## TWO VIEWS OF PREHISTORIC SITES Chris Lintz & David Ross Boyd Share Stage At September 18<sup>th</sup> HCAA General Meeting

HCAA members will hear talks by two professional archeologists at the next general meeting set for Saturday, September 18, 2010 at Riverside Nature Center.

The meeting will begin at 12:30 p.m. with refreshments and socializing, followed by a brief business meeting. The talks will begin shortly after 1:00 p.m. HCAA and the public are fortunate to hear two speakers on two distinct topics.

### JACK ALLEN SITE

Dr. Chris Lintz returns to HCAA with a discussion of the pre-historic picket-post house and two storage pits excavated in Hutchinson County at a site known as the Jack Allen site in 1969 and 1970. The house has many architectural attributes of the Antelope Creek phase culture. The talk will focus on the fieldwork at the Jack Allen ranch and comparative examples from the region.

### CALF CREEK CULTURE

Oklahoma archeologist Dr. David Ross Boyd will speak on the latest evidence regarding age and environments associated with the groups making the Calf Creek (Bell and Andice in Texas) material culture.

Having spent 50 years working in Oklahoma as a professional archeologist, Dr. Boyd will bring a wealth of knowledge of past environments and the Caddoan tribes.

## OCTOBER IS TEXAS ARCHEOLOGY MONTH

Each October, Texas Archeology Month (TAM) is sponsored by the Texas Historical Commission, the Texas Archeological Society and the Council of Texas Archeologists.

## HCAA CELEBRATES TEXAS ARCHEOLOGY WITH “RENDEZVOUS BY THE RIVER” ON OCTOBER 16

The Riverside Nature Center will be transformed by HCAA into a hands-on museum of Texas Archeology on October 16<sup>th</sup>. The Archeological Celebration, called “Rendezvous by the River” after the prehistoric people who lived in the Hill Country, will offer HCAA members and the public opportunities to learn about and participate in the heritage archeologists work so diligently to preserve. HCAA encourages all members to attend.



Two expert speakers will provide new insights. Dr. Stance Hurst, Field Manager and Researcher at Texas Tech, will take us back to very early times with his talk on “Changes in Territoriality during the Paleoindian Period on the Southern Plains” at 11:00 in the morning. At 1:00 p.m. Dr. Chris Lintz (described in preceding articles in this newsletter), will speak on “Stone Tool Cache Diversity on the Southern Plains.”

As the above 2009 photo of Atlatl throwing illustrates, there are always interesting demonstrations at the Archeology Celebration, including: flint knapping, mock dig, bow and arrow, tomahawk throw, earth oven, paint-making, and learning to throw the atlatl. Native American drummers and dancers will transform the site. Experts will interpret artifacts, and inform landowners about the surveys and investigations conducted by HCAA fieldwork teams. Several archeology groups will set up informational tables. Books, hats and T-shirts will be available to purchase.
